

Homework-5 for Math 431**Due Date: 29 April 2022 Friday**

Show that a k -algebra B is isomorphic to the affine coordinate ring of some algebraic set in \mathbb{A}^n , for some n , if and only if B is a finitely generated k -algebra with no nilpotent elements. Explain why you need no nilpotent elements.

Solution:

Let B be generated as a k -algebra by the elements $f_1, \dots, f_n \in B$. Consider the exact sequence

$$0 \rightarrow J \rightarrow k[x_1, \dots, x_n] \xrightarrow{\phi} B \rightarrow 0,$$

where ϕ is an algebra morphism defined as

$$\phi(x_i) = f_i, \quad i = 1, \dots, n,$$

and $J = \ker \phi$.

Suppose B has a nilpotent element $b \neq 0$ with $b^m = 0$ for some m . Since ϕ is onto, there exists an element $u \in k[x_1, \dots, x_n]$ such that $b = \phi(u)$. Clearly $b \notin J$. But $0 = b^m = \phi(u)^m = \phi(u^m)$. This shows that while $u \notin J$, we have $u^m \in J$. Hence J is not a radical ideal and cannot be the ideal of an algebraic set.

Conversely assume that B has no nilpotent elements. Assume that $u^m \in J$ for some m . Then $0 = \phi(u^m) = \phi(u)^m$. But since B has no nilpotent elements, $\phi(u) = 0$, forcing $u \in J$. Hence J is a radical ideal and is the ideal of some variety. B being $k[x_1, \dots, x_n]/J$ is then the coordinate ring of that variety.
